 - 2. Define love. Provide short examples of this definition from each of the following three texts: *Romeo and Juliet*, *The Giver*, and *The Outsiders*. Summarize how the author of each text defines "love". Answer must be 100 words or less.
 - 3. Compare how the **theme of love** is visually explored in these three films: *Romeo* + *Juliet* (1996 version), *The Giver*, and *The Outsiders*. Describe how each film conveys the idea of love. Answer must be 100 words or less.
 - 4. Explain how one word, *love*, can be used to both describe romance between lovers and the love between an infant child and their parent? When **Martin Luther King Jr.** speaks of love, how does this connect to these other kinds of love? Use a quote or paraphrase from Martin Luther King Jr. to develop and support your point. Answer must be 100 words or less.
