Thesis

Definition

- 1. The thesis is the point of the paper. There is always one, and only one, thesis for each paper.
 - A good thesis is theoretical, meaning that it explains how or why and is based on rigorous and systematic thinking.

Why It Matters

- 1. A good paper develops a thesis. That means that a good paper explains one thing well.
- 2. Thesis and theory are closely connected ideas. A good thesis will reflect rigorous and systematic thinking, it will be theoretical.
- 3. Your papers must explain something. Your papers must focus on one (and only one) thesis.
- 4. The writing process helps you focus on a thesis and helps you fully develop, or explain, the thesis.

How to Use It

- 1. Learn about theories, "theory", and theoretical thinking. Learn to analyse.
- 2. Find something to focus on. Develop a "focusing question" that asks how or why. Then answer it (with "by" or "because"). The answer to your focusing question will be your thesis. Write a thesis statement. Then fully explain the thesis statement.
